- To acquire or otherwise deal with land, buildings, leases, personal property, interests or rights with the object of furthering the interests of the Club.
- To carry on any other activities whatsoever calculated directly or indirectly to enhance further the interests of the Club such that profits are expended in furtherance of these Objectives only.
- To strive for governmental and public recognition of Surf Life Saving as the authority on aquatic safety.
- To promote the health and safety of members and users of the aquatic environment.

STRATEGIC PLAN

What is a strategic planning?

Strategic planning is an organisation's process of defining its strategy, or direction, and making decisions on allocating its resources to pursue this strategy. It may also extend to control mechanisms for guiding the implementation of the strategy. Strategic planning became prominent in corporations during the 1960s and remains an important aspect of strategic management. It is executed by strategic planners or strategists, who involve many parties and research sources in their analysis of the organisation and its relationship to the environment in which it competes.

Strategy has many definitions, but generally involves setting goals, determining actions to achieve the goals, and mobilising resources to execute the actions. A strategy describes how the ends (goals) will be achieved by the means (resources). The senior leadership of an organisation is generally tasked with determining strategy. Strategy can be planned (intended) or can be observed as a pattern of activity (emergent) as the organization adapts to its environment or competes.

In July 2016 your Committee held a planning workshop to produce a 5 year Strategic Plan. Within this Strategic Plan we set priorities (focus energy and resources), strengthen operations, ensure that members are working toward common goals, establish agreement around intended outcomes/results, and assesses and adjusted our Club's direction in response to a changing environment

Our strategic management is a comprehensive collection of ongoing activities and processes that we will use to coordinate and align resources and actions with mission, vision and strategy throughout our Club.





PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The 2016/17 season began in the aftermath of the June storms that revealed rocks and other pieces of antiquities not seen since 1974. After that storm the Club was rebuilt in 1976, set back to the footprint as we know it now.

Like the work that was done re establishing the beach, which we are grateful for the restoration work the Northern Beaches Council provided, your newly elected Club Committee started to prepare for the season ahead.

In July, our first meeting started with a planning day and by-law review to reflect the prior changes to the constitution. In August the Bush to Beach team put forward their plans for January. November and December saw the conclusion to a lot of work around the by-law updates. January saw the shortfall in patrol personnel now filled with dedicated patrols assigned to fill the rosters and in February we opened the new kitchen also acquired new equipment, an IRB motor and hull, boards and defib

It is encouraging to see new members take up Committee roles and I welcome members Kylie Ryder who took on the role of Director of Education and Marnie Gordon who took on the role of Director of Administration. Both contributed significantly to the meetings and ongoing projects.

This season we ran two Bronze courses and successfully trained 10 new Bronze holders as well as having two young members gain their Bronze Medallion through the SNB Surf School. Jake Warner spent many hours guiding the course participants through their paces and overall has done an outstanding job in the training role.

We have 76 Nippers and once again this year I congratulate Richard Dowling for his continued contribution to this very important part of our Club. Richard is also active on the Committee and Patrol Captain.

Mark 'Boof' Dimento, Independent Director - Building, again contributed greatly to the Club's building matters and initiated the conversation with our new Café tenants. This season saw his vision for our new Training Room start to take shape.

The Jaffa and Jiffy Jaffa are just a few of the many highlights and new initiatives of Sarah's contribution this season. Sarah personally distributed over 5000 welcome to SNSLSC brochures throughout the local area and painstakingly drafted many of the amendments to the By- laws. Sarah's workload has been significant.

Our first priority is to fulfil our lifesaving commitment and I am grateful to Tony Haven AM for his willingness to take on the Director of Lifesaving role while managing a variety of other significant priorities.

Director of Finance Charles Longley has again provided fiscal leadership and guidance in managing the Club's finances. Thankyou Charles for this but also for the many other administrative and jobs you do around the Club.

Finally, a big thanks to Rohan Fisher for his continued presence on the Committee and his considerable input to debates, policy and decisions.

Our key financial metrics have improved this season and we recorded an operating profit of \$150. That doesn't seem a lot however, against last year's loss of (\$50,000) this is a positive result and shows that aside from assets we accrued, we covered our daily expenses. Overall this year, income the Club received was up and importantly we have successfully managed our expenditure down.

As Club membership fees only contribute 10% to our income stream we need to constantly secure income from a variety of sources, namely:

- 1.Club events provide much needed funds such as
- The Club Golf day in February now in its 2nd year was a success and we thank Sarah and Matt Oaten for organising this.
- Casino night, organised by Rohan Fisher was another great initiative and a lot of fun.
- 2. The OVR has made significant strides in increasing its income and Thanks to Nicole Prestinenzi with the support of Charles has increased revenue by +39% v. LY. Well done Nicole.

The capital works to upgrade the Kitchen facilities were necessary and can be seen to be a well received and contributed to our increased bookings.

3. The café has been reconfigured and just opened under the management of Trevor and Ursulina of Drip Coffee Traders (Aubreen Street, Collaroy Plateau) and they have done a first-class job in the makeover. I encourage all members and their families to try them out.

This year we conducted an external risk assessment on the event in December to ensure that the Club and the B2B organisers were not missing any issue to provide the safest platform to run this event. Thank you to Greencap who conducted the risk assessment. I am pleased to be able to confirm in April that the balance of all funds held by SNSLSC over the years along with the Club provisions set aside on B2B's behalf have been donated back to Bush to Beach founder Jack Cannons.



<u>IRB REPORT</u>

Well another season has gone by and as far as the IRB was concerned some great achievements and support to the community. Thankfully there were no major incidents/accidents associated with the IRB this season which on occasion can be dangerous at South Narrabeen especially when that shore dump is big. The IRB was pivotal in our beach operations again this season with a number of rescue assists and full rescues including Troy Stephen (driver) and Connor Shapcott (crewman) involved in a dual rescue which also involved Max Stephen and Marcus McKinnon swimming out in big surf along with the lifeguard on his rescue board to firstly secure the patients-a great combined effort. The IRB was also involved in numerous search and rescues during the season and two that come to mind was the S&R off Narrabeen beach where a PFD was spotted floating in the water with no-one attached to it which Brian Grundy (driver) and Mike Renie (crewman) responded to. Probably more notable was when Sarah Oaten (driving) with Richard Dowling (crewman) were requested to take part in a S&R around Long reef headland when a surf board washed up on the beach with no owner attached. This was on arguably one of the biggest surf days of the season, I heard they did a fantastic job and got back to the beach safely afterwards which was a great result, the surfer was also later found safe by making it to shore under his own steam and walking into the police station to claim his surf board.

The state of our IRB equipment presently is exceptionally good for a small club like ours. We were lucky enough to secure a NSW clubs Grant from Manly Leagues club in Brookvale which enabled us to purchase a new Thundercat 377 Gen II IRB, a new Mercury 2 stroke outboard motor and new fuel cell. This was a fantastic contribution and we are extremely thankful to Manly Leagues club for providing us the opportunity to further improve our critical lifesaving equipment. This equipment in association with our existing Arancia 377 IRB and three Yamaha motors (all of which are less than 3 years old). Sets us up perfectly for the coming seasons ahead. Thanks to Charles for his ongoing assistance with the equipment purchases and managing the finance associated with this.

There was only one IRB training course run this season which was a crew course, the assessment took place at an unfamiliar beach for the candidates (Dee Why beach), using unfamiliar equipment (Dee Why IRB's) and for some of the candidates had unfamiliar drivers (Dee Why SLS drivers). It was great to see that all 6 candidates who were all 15 or 16 years of age took it in their stride and did a fantastic job to display their natural and newly found IRB skills to gain the IRB Crew Certificate. Congratulations to Max Stephen, Josh Papalia, Marcus McKinnon, Lexie McKinnon, Connor Shapcott and Ben Hews. Huge thanks must also go to Brian Grundy, Mike Renie, Simon Learmonth, Troy Stephen and Matt Fordham for their involvement in the IRB training, without a team effort it would be extremely challenging to run these courses. We intend to run an IRB drivers course during the winter months and if interest is there another IRB Crew course in summer. A special thanks to everyone who was involved with the IRB last season, whether it be in operations, training or providing background support, it is very much appreciated as the IRB is a critical lifesaving resource that is relied on during the year both during patrols and afterhours.

- Increasing year on year numbers of active patrol members

Thanks to all those people that give their time helping with these areas throughout the season, across all of the awards categories from Bronze through to IRB proficiencies. This takes up a lot of time not only on the beach but ensuring all the administration is completed.

It was great to see that this year, we had good numbers doing our Bronze training and an increase in our Surf Rescue Certificate participants. We welcome these new award holders onto the beach and our patrols.

Across other awards, we should be proud as a Club to see a focus on doing higher certification with a huge take up of Advanced Resuscitation Techniques (ARTC) and maintaining numbers/slight decline across the other awards areas such as IRB crew, and Basic Beach Management. For full training numbers please refer to the table below showing year on year award numbers.

The strategic plan that Education has in place, started all of the actions for this year and delivered to 3 of the 6. Initiatives throughout this year such as having external trainers and one day courses improved take up of courses, whilst still delivering the learning standards. Education has gotten some great learnings that we will be taking forward as maintain the above key components and have a particular focus on:

- Increasing training officers within the Club
- Increasing our IRB capabilities
- Implement changes to the Bronze award in line with recommendations of SLSA

We are a small Club compared to some others in our Branch but we have a terrific commitment to what we are doing as surf lifesavers which is reflected in our skill levels.

In the coming months, look out for times organised to learn about what education opportunities exist, as there is something for everyone and in a lot of instances this will help you both on and off the beach. It may surprise many of us just how expansive it is. Otherwise, please feel free to reach out to the Education team or your patrol captain if you want to do an award or learn something more.

MEMBER SERVICES REPORT

In October 2016, the Independent Director for Marketing had a change of portfolio to Member Services. While the position is new at Club level, the portfolio aligns with our Branch and State Boards.

The core components of Member Services include membership (recruitment, retention, member welfare and statistical trends), member development (junior surf life saving, leadership development), member recognition (internal and external awards) and organisational development (structure, governance and compliance).

To start the season we had two recruitment drives, one in September and one in October. A letterbox drop in our local area to help promote our 'Come N Try' Nippers weekends and the Surf Club Open Day that was held on October 16 were successful. We had around 60 new members, a third of which came from the letterbox drop catchment. Our membership was on the down turn for the second season, like any Club we go through peaks and troughs. The 2017/2018 season will again be a season of building.

Junior Development is always an important part of Club land and this season introduced a Rookie Program. This program was in its infancy and will continue to grow. We had an impressive 11 candidates gain their Surf Rescue Certificate at the end of the season and enthusiastically completed their first patrol in April and 12 new Bronze Medallions.

As a committee we came together and formed a Strategic Plan and set goals based on the information contained in this report. This program also leads into the Quality Club Program. The Surf Life Saving NSW Quality Club Program provides a linear pathway for progression and is a highly effective audit tool, providing quick reference and identification of best practice operations. Ultimately it assists our Club to strengthen its governance and management, be compliant with legislation and build the capacity of our volunteers and programs. I gives me great pleasure to announce that we were successful in attaining the bronze status in the Quality Club Program in 2016/2017. It is a goal of mine next season to work towards attaining the silver status.

Additionally, your Committee revised the Club By-Laws. By-Laws are an important part of compliance and governance used to ensure we regulate ourselves. We also continued to provide our members with fortnightly updates through a new concept the 'Jiffy Jaffa' as well as provide quarterly updates with an overall update from all the Directors. Our presence on Facebook was strong and our website was updated regularly through the season.

Thank you to all of our members for your contribution this season. Not only has it helped with the overall growth of our Club in personnel but also creates a good Club culture.

In order to make the kiosk/café (restaurant) more functional plus a going concern, we successfully applied to Council, to add a new gas kitchen, exhaust fan, permanent awning and to open up the premises.

The outcome is fantastic, to that extent I'd like to welcome Ursulina Damiens and Trevor Griffiths who have done a magnificent job fitting out the kiosk/café. So, when you're at the beach next call in and have a coffee and soak up some of the ambiance.

OVR Kitchen

As mentioned last year in my report the OVR Kitchen was in sad need of repairs and rejuvenation. With Council's consent we set about to bring the kitchen into the 21st century. The result speaks for itself, as hall hire is up the comments about the kitchen have exceed our expectation.

Donors and Grants

Significant contributions included

Hall hire was up 39% on previous year and continues to be the Club's major source of income.

Casino night in its inaugural year raised \$2,066. Special thanks to Rohan Fisher.

Golf Day in its second year raised \$2,197. Special thanks to Sarah and Matt Oaten.

Expenditure Highlights

If you take out depreciation and loss on sale of assets, expenditure was steady.

The Club spent \$18,786 on renovating the OVR kitchen and bar, \$12,600 on the kiosk/Cafe and \$28,000 on life saving equipment. Total capital investment for the past seven years, \$395,000 Operating expenses item (f) were up due the purchases of clothing for seniors.


